
Advanced Placement World History

Course Overview

Curriculum

- The AP World History course covers the time period from c. 1200 A.D. to the late twentieth century
 - This includes:
 - The Silk Roads and Asian dominance
 - Land Based Empires
 - Rise of Europe
 - The Renaissance
 - Maritime Empires
 - The Columbian Exchange
 - The Industrial Revolution
 - Imperialism
 - The rise of fascism and militarism in Europe and Asia
 - World War I and II
 - Decolonialization
 - The Cold War
 - Globalization





Curriculum

The following are important course themes that we will encounter over the course of the year.

- Humans and the Environment
- Cultural Developments and Interactions
- Governance
- Economic Systems
- Social Interactions and Organization
- Technology and Innovations



Thinking Skills

- As you examine global history through the above themes, you will be asked to make connections across regions, analyze, question, and argue the relevance of historical processes.
- Some of these skills are
 - Continuity and change over time
 - Comparison
 - Causation

Class Assessments

- As a college level course there is a heavy emphasis on academic reading
 - textbook
 - scholarly articles
- There are four parts to the AP exam in May. Three of those parts consist of long and short writing modes
 - Short Answer Questions
 - Long Essay Question
 - Document Based Question (DBQ)
- Thus, reading and writing are essential to passing the course and the test
- In addition there will be reading check quizzes and oral discussions



Assignments

- Students need to come to class prepared by having read or completed the homework assignment or previous night's readings.
- Each week there at least one chapter from the textbook will be assigned.
- There may also be an outside reading or two consisting of an article to add to understanding the unit of study



vocabulary and map skills

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- **This course involves a lot of specific vocabulary words. There are about 15-20 vocabulary words per chapter or unit of study. (roughly every two or three weeks)**
 - **Students will receive a quiz each time they get a list of words.**
 - **Knowing where a particular place or region is on a map is key to understanding political changes over time. Consequently, there will be map quizzes to build knowledge on the locations of important countries.**




Advanced Placement Curriculum: An Accelerated Approach

- Advanced Placement courses take an accelerated approach in contrast to standard high school courses
- Students in Advanced Placement courses cover similar content in high school world history classes but are finished by April in order to allow 4-5 weeks of review.
